# The Gregorian Chant

St. Gregory the Great Episcopal Church, Athens, GA

Dearly Beloved,

On Tuesday, October 26, the Athens Justice Project is honoring Milner Ball for his work throughout the years in our community. He has been called the conscience of the Law School at UGA, encouraging students to look into their hearts to discover how justice and fairness can be achieved using law as a tool. He believes that the best results are achieved with less violence, more justice, more fairness and the most humanity.

It was the study of scripture which led him to political action. As an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church, he served a congregation in Tennessee and then came to the Presbyterian Student Center at UGA as a campus chaplain. He started Insight House where African American and white students lived and met together. He demonstrated for civil rights. After he attended the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago as a member of a challenge delegation from Georgia led by Julian Bond, he was fired from his position at UGA and decided to study the law as another way to effect social change.

Milner took students to soup kitchens and shelters as part of their jurisprudence studies. He taught environmental law for the first time from materials he created. He challenged students to define the law more broadly. He liked to describe the law as "coral" rather than rock. Coral has structure but is a living and changing organism. Even when it is endangered, its growth can be nurtured and protected.

I feel I have missed something precious not having heard Milner preach, since his illness has prevented him from doing so from the time I have been at St. Gregory's. So I was thrilled to discover recently that he wrote a book, *Called by Stories: Biblical Sagas and Their Challenge for Law*. He says there, "Gradually and increasingly, however, I found that the more I engaged in and thought about law, the more necessary it became to have recourse to their [the biblical stories'] capacity for generating understanding and critique.

Then—and this is where I am now—I discovered that I had to start with the stories. They impressed themselves upon me as compelling and normative. They seized me. I have no better way to say it. The experience was not mystical. It was and is ordinary living, acting, thinking writing, and reading." (p. 5)

At the close of his consideration of the place of law in John's gospel, Milner says, "The lawyer becomes a witness in the midst of her lawyering in its ordinary circumstances, and her practice points beyond itself to the transcendent reality within which the person and the practice daily subsist—as though within a womb. . . . The Word was put to death by law. But the author of John does not reject the law. As witness to the possibilities of its transfiguration, he appropriates law as a language for the gospel. In spite of itself, law is made a medium of the transcendent. That the gospel's author writes like a lawyer offers unexpected hope for what 'lawyerlike' can mean." (p. 145)

I might add that Milner's life and witness offers that same unexpected hope. We give thanks to God that Milner's life and work has been a magnificent expression of his wish for the law: "to keep human life human."

### **Adult Christian Education**

The group is reading and discussing *The Resurrection of Jesus: John Dominic Crossan and N.T. Wright in Dialogue*. believes the opposite. In addition to the debate, there is a short history of biblical scholarship over the last two hundred years and a number of essays on the subject. The books will be available at the parish office in early October. They cost \$13.50.

### **Prayer List**

Every Sunday, in the Prayers of the People, we intercede for a list of names. How do the names get into the Prayers of the People? In the narthex in the niche on the right with the Register of Services, is a notebook labeled Intercessory Prayers. People can put the names of those they wish to be prayed for (including themselves) in that notebook, or even easier, just call Hortense, and she will add requested names to the list. For privacy's sake we only use first names, and do not included any reason of why a person is in need of prayers. At the beginning of the month, we start with fresh pages and a new list. Some people need to stay on the prayer list longer than a month. If the person you request prayers for needs to stay on the list, please call Hortense, who keeps track of those names. And, please, let her know when the person is to be removed from the prayer list.



## Altar Flowers

How can I have some altar flower dedicated to a loved one? Very easily: In the Christian Education building, next to the kitchen counter, is an Altar Flower Chart, with a space for every Sunday of the year. You pick your preferred Sunday, make sure nobody else has signed up for it, write your name in that space AND fill out a Flower Dedication form, which is bright yellow and usually in the vicinity of the flower chart (the forms do get moved around sometimes), leave it at the church office, and make a donation to the Flower Guild. The suggested donation is \$35. If you have preferences you can indicate those on the form. If the form does not come through the office, your dedication cannot be included in the bulletin. Please give the Flower Guild and the office as much notice as possible.
